STUDENT ILLNESS	Procedures shall be established by the administration to ensure that proper attention is given any student who becomes ill during the course of a school day.
ACCIDENTS INVOLVING STUDENTS	Emergency procedures shall be established by the administration to ensure proper attention for any student injured at school. Records shall be maintained on all accidents that require the attention of a medical doctor.
EMERGENCY TREATMENT FORMS	Each year, students and parents shall complete and sign a form that provides emergency information and authorizes school officials to obtain emergency medical treatment, as provided by law.
ADMINISTERING MEDICATION	No employee shall give any student prescription medication, non-prescription medication, herbal substances, anabolic steroids, or dietary supplements of any type, except as provided below.
EXCEPTIONS	Unless limited by licensure, employees authorized by the Superintendent or designee may administer to students, including students with individualized education programs or Section 504 plans:
PROVIDED BY PARENT	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Prescription medication in accordance with legal requirements. [See FFAC(LEGAL)] Prescription medication must be administered in compliance with the prescription contained on the label.2. Nonprescription, or homeopathic medication, dietary supplements, and herbal supplements will be given as listed below:<ol style="list-style-type: none">a. For up to ten days, upon a parent's written request, when properly labeled and in the original container.b. Nonprescription and homeopathic medications Must be approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and must appear in the United States Pharmacopia. Homeopathic medication may be administered as instructed by the parent or guardian provided instruction isc. Must be consistent with the recommended usage provided on the label.d. In addition to legal requirements, the District also requires a written request from a physician or other health care professional with authority to write prescriptions to administer nonprescription, or homeopathic medication, herbal substances or dietary supplements when such medications, substances, or dietary supplements

are to be administered for more than ten consecutive school days.

3. Nonprescription medication, homeopathic, dietary supplements or herbal substances will be given in accordance with a Student's Individual Plano or 504 Plan.

- 4.** Nonprescription medication provided on an emergency basis by the District and consistent with:
- a. Protocols established by the District's medical advisor who must be licensed to practice medicine in the state of Texas; and
 - b. Parental consent given on the emergency treatment form.

PSYCHOTROPICS

Except as permitted by Education Code 38.016, an employee shall not:

- 1. Recommend to a student or a parent that the student use a psychotropic drug;
- 2. Suggest a particular diagnosis; or
- 3. Exclude the student from a class or a school-related activity because of the parent's refusal to consent to psychiatric evaluation or examination or treatment of the student.

CLEAN INTERMITTENT
CATHETERIZATIONS

Clean intermittent catheterizations are a special service that shall be performed only when the ARD committee determines it is necessary. The procedure shall only be performed by a school nurse or may be delegated to an individual who has received specific training from a registered nurse for clean intermittent catheterizations.
