10th Grade Going into 11th Grade

To continue to develop your personal tastes in reading and to maintain (and even increase) your reading skill level, you are encouraged to read at least 10 full-length texts over the summer months. Read a variety of genres, including nonfiction, contemporary fiction, and classic literature.
