Recommendation:

Students are required and responsible to memorize vocabulary and use it in their interpersonal or expressive practice. As is true for any language, each class builds on vocabulary and grammatical structures. Videos will be provided by the teacher for students to practice with, yet it is the student's responsibility to understand the concepts and visit the teacher for tutorials if/when necessary. **Note:** Students have been known to create their own flashcards to help with their ASL studies.

Course Overview:

American Sign Language (ASL) is an integration of expressive and receptive skills with emphasis on fingerspelling, numbers, glossing, signs, phrases and sentences at the beginning level. **Note:** ASL is **NOT** English. Deaf people have their own culture, and their language has its own syntax, grammar, and rules. This course will provide students with information on Deaf culture and the general usage of signs and grammatical structure.

Method of Instruction:

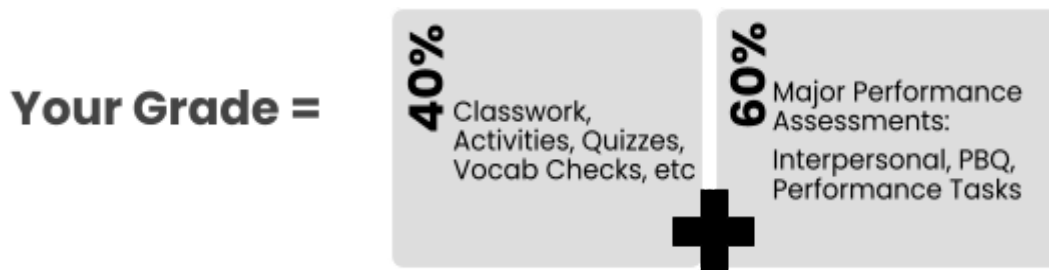
- Often a “No Voice” classroom environment to maintain use of target language.
- Use of video/audio presentations.

- Video presentations are used for assignments and assessments. Improvement is seen when a student is able to view themselves signing.
- Increase in grammatical complexity & emphasis on signed responses.
- Engaging in conversational dialogues as an individual and with partner(s).

Class Expectations:

- Be Prepared. - Have what you need ready to go and ready to learn.
- Be Productive. - Be on task and participate. Participation is key in a performance-based class.
- Be Respectful. - Respect yourself. Respect others. Respect the teacher. Respect the classroom.
- Be Prompt. - Be in class on time, in your seat, and ready to begin.

Course Grades, Evaluations & Assessments:



Major Performance Assessment Types: ALL are worth ONE in the gradebook.

- Performance Based “Quiz” (PBQ) - Expressive Single Student assessment.
- Interpersonal (IP) - Conversation between two or more individuals.
- Performance (CAP) - Expressive assessment involving only ONE student.

*****Except for the PBQ, retakes are NOT allowed on major performance-based assessments*****

Retakes:

If a student’s **Daily Grade and/or Written Assignment** is below an 80, the student has the opportunity to retake the assignment or assessment for a maximum of 80 points. Yet, they **MUST**:

1. Attend tutorials to relearn the material.
2. Schedule a time to retake the assignment within ONE week of the original assignment.

Gradebook FYI:

If you see the following codes in place of a grade in the gradebook:

Z = Zero BUT the assignment is eligible for make-up
 O = Earned Grade/Not Turned In
 X = Exempt/Not Factored into Grade

Late Work:

Everyday an assignment is late, **10 points** will be **deducted** from the final grade. **NOTE:** Miss Bates reserves the right to provide an alternate assignment to makeup the work.
