Financial Milestones

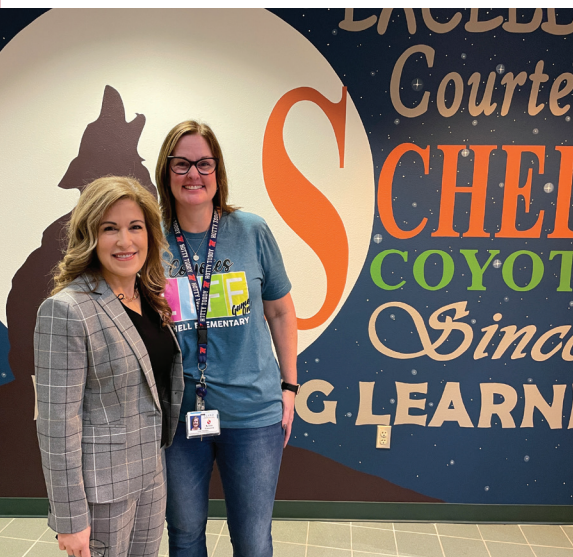
The successful passage of the Bond and Voter Approval Tax Rate Elections marked a significant achievement:

- Gained an additional \$9 million annually for operational funding

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

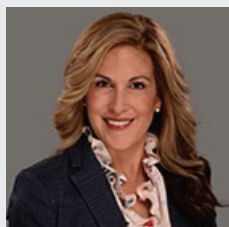

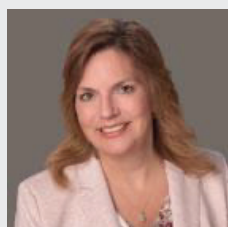

TEA 2022 STATE ACCOUNTABILITY RATINGS

Districts and campuses receive an overall rating, as well as a rating for each domain on a 0-100 scale. The three domains are:

1. Student Achievement evaluates performance across all subjects for all students, on both general and alternate assessments, College, Career, and Military Readiness (CCMR) indicators, and graduation rates.
2. School Progress measures district and campus outcomes in two areas: the number of students that grew at least one year academically (or are on track) as measured by STAAR results and the achievement of all students relative to districts or campuses with similar economically disadvantaged percentages.
3. Closing the Gaps uses disaggregated data to demonstrate differentials among racial/ethnic groups, socioeconomic backgrounds and other factors. The indicators included in this domain, as well as the domain's construction, align the state's accountability system with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

✚ The extended 88th Texas Legislative Session concluded in late May 2023, and Plano ISD trustees and other leaders were actively involved throughout the session to advocate for students, staff and the community. Their efforts included meeting one-on-one with legislators both locally and in Austin.

The district's legislative priorities were approved by the Board of Trustees in August 2022 after several inclusive conversations based on the district's needs. They included:

MORE THAN A SCORE

Recognizing that students are more than a letter grade, Plano ISD launched the "More Than a Score" campaign during the 88th Texas Legislative Session. The district engages in continuous improvement efforts to ensure students are on grade level (or above) and growing every year.

Although the Texas Education Agency (TEA) assigns districts and schools a letter grade for

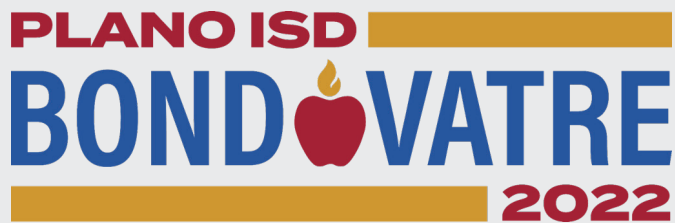

Schools no longer have the same buying power as they did in 2019 when the \$6,160 basic allotment was set. Average inflation since August 2019 has increased by 17% according to the Consumer Price Index. That means in order to have the same buying power as they did after HB 3 was passed, the basic allotment would need to be over \$7,100.

Plano ISD thanks our community as the district received support from voters for multiple crucial initiatives aimed at transforming education in the district through the passing of a \$1.35 Billion Bond & VATRE Referendum.

FUNDING FOR STAFF & PROGRAMS

VATRE PROP A

A Voter Approval Tax Rate Election (VATRE) is an election required by the state that asks voters to consider approving a modified tax rate to increase revenue for student programs as well as teacher and staff salaries. The net revenue generated by this election will provide \$9 million annually.

SCHOOL RENOVATIONS & SAFETY

BOND PROP B

Nearly \$1.2 billion dollars has been allocated for various school renovations and security upgrades that will be guided by the district facility audit performed in the summer of 2022. This includes building a Career & Technical Education center, major renovations at Plano ISD's three senior high schools, rebuilding Haggard Middle School, track fields at each middle school campus, renovations to the Plano ISD Transportation Services Center, and more.

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY

BOND PROP C

Proposition C will allow the district to issue \$173 million in bonds for instructional technology, which includes new mobile devices for students, classroom multimedia audio-visual equipment, data center upgrades as well as end user technology replacements.



The Plano ISD total tax rate is **6.1 cents lower than last year** with approval of the VATRE and bond propositions.



FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

Plano ISD is committed to providing transparent financial information in an easily accessible format that is clear and meaningful to our community. Financial transparency is achieved through summaries, visualizations and downloadable data as well as other relevant financial information. One of the two major ongoing goals of the district is to ensure efficient use of financial resources and budgeting. Certain indexes and reporting systems allow for measurement of the financial sustainability of Plano ISD.

QUEST PROGRAM

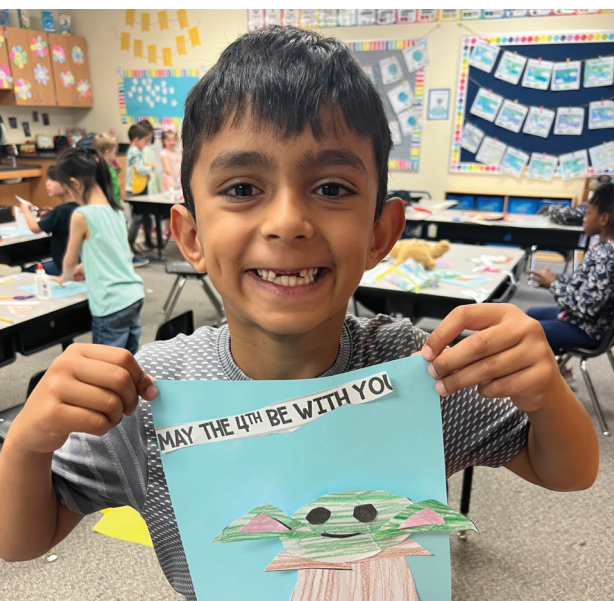
What Is QuEST?

The QuEST Program is a pioneering initiative designed to recruit and support students and individuals within Plano ISD who aspire to become teachers. In collaboration with Teachworthy and Indiana Wesleyan University (IWU), this program offers an expedited pathway to a college degree and teacher certification.

Pathways Offered

QuEST offers two distinct pathways tailored to different candidates:

- **Degree Seeker Pathway:** Ideal for current Plano ISD employees who do not hold a bachelor’s degree, this pathway allows participants to work towards a Bachelor of Science in Integrative Studies from IWU alongside obtaining their Texas Teacher Certification from Teachworthy. Upon completion, graduates can embark on their teaching journey as associate teachers.
- **Career Seeker Pathway:** Tailored for Plano ISD high school seniors, this pathway sets the stage for a career in education. Participants can start as classroom assistants and progress to associate teachers while pursuing their bachelor’s degree and teacher certification.



STUDENT RECOGNITIONS



NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS

Plano ISD joins with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC®) to congratulate 105 Plano ISD National Merit Program® semifinalists in the 68th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Students entered the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2021 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors. To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the Semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received.

A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn

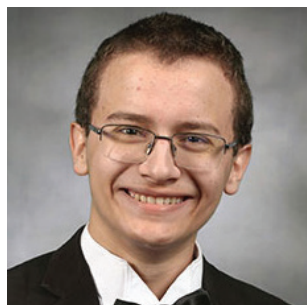
SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test. From over 16,000 Semifinalists, more than 15,000 are expected to advance to the Finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation. All National Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from this group of Finalists. Merit Scholar designees are selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies. 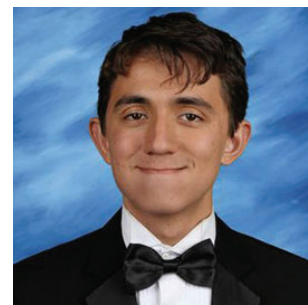

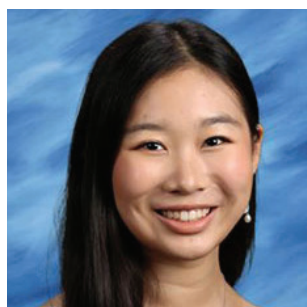

PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP CANDIDATES

The U.S. Department of Education released the list of 2023 U.S. Presidential Scholarship candidates, which included 10 Plano ISD students. The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, by executive order of the president, to recognize and honor some of the nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. Annually, almost 4,000 students are selected as candidates for the award. Application is by invitation only; therefore, students may not apply individually to

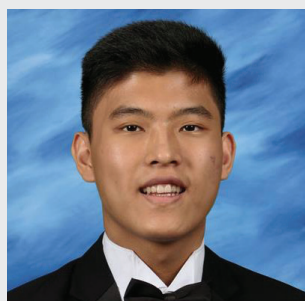
the program, nor may their schools nominate them.

Candidates must submit candidacy materials including essays, self-assessments, secondary school reports and transcripts and are evaluated on their academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities, as well as an analysis of their essay. From candidate submissions, approximately 500 semifinalists are chosen by an independent, national committee of educators convened by the Commission on Presidential Scholars. Semifinalists are identified for each state/jurisdiction by the review committee. The number of semifinalists identified per state/jurisdiction is based on a proportionate number of test takers for that state.

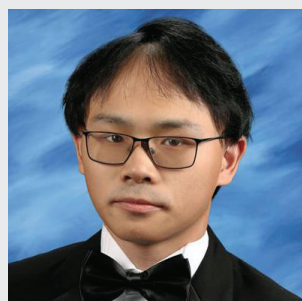

- 6 Automotive Technology students from Plano East and Plano Senior High Schools participated in the North Texas Automobile Dealers Auto Tech Competition, partnering with local dealerships to provide training and mentoring to participating students.
- The 2023 Gateway Engineering Summer Camp provided exciting opportunities for 150 rising 7th and 8th graders to explore and engage in hands-on, project based learning of engineering, design, and building concepts.
- The computer science program was able to expand opportunities for students this summer. 36 3rd Grade students and 49 4th grade students participated in the Power of Coding, where they learned to program bots and on screen.
- 86 middle school students participated in our first ever Capital One Coders Summer Camps where they learned to program in HyperText Markup Language (HTML) and Cascading Style Sheets (CSS) to make websites.
- 140 rising 9th graders participated in this year's Computer Science Summer Bridge program and learned to program in Python program language and engaged with industry professionals.

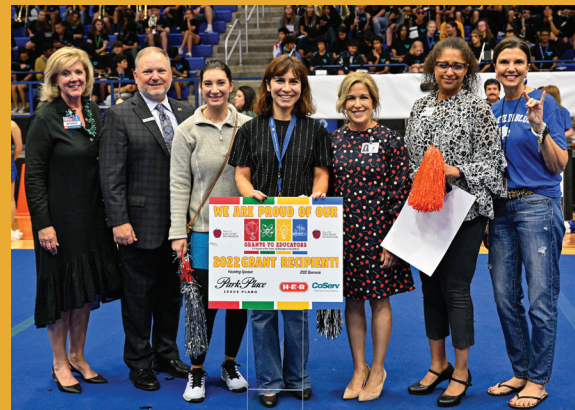
PARTNERS IN EDUCATION
