


PLANO ISD EDUCATION FOUNDATION ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN



Plano Independent School District is a leader in fine arts education. The District recognizes that fine arts have intrinsic value in student development, and participation not only fosters interpersonal skills such as self-reliance, responsibility, problem-solving, and teamwork, but increases the likelihood that a student will graduate from school, attend college and meet commended status on standardized tests.

Acknowledging these benefits, Plano ISD implements a sequential fine arts curriculum that allows each student to build skill and understanding through a wide variety of artistic experiences. It all starts in elementary school, where students receive weekly visual arts and music instruction. In middle school, students can continue their artistic journeys in band, orchestra, choir, public speaking, debate, theatre, technical theatre, and 2D/3D art classes. By the time students reach high school, they can select from 84 distinct courses in art, dance, music, speech, and theatre.



This impressive level of dedication has led to other distinctions for the District including:



- Nationally recognized by National Association of Music Merchants Foundation as one of the best communities for music education.
- One of the highest percentages of all-state musicians in Texas.
- 3 of the Top 10 programs in Texas for AP art and music theory.

Despite these accolades and Plano ISD's commitment to fine arts, the District suffered from a lack of suitable performance space to accommodate these high-level programs and the volume of students who want to participate.

Among all 72 campuses in Plano ISD, only four have auditoriums appropriate for performances, and these have seating capacities of under 700. All high school, middle school, and elementary school campuses, except for one, have designated performance spaces connected with a gymnasium or auditorium. This not only limits the kinds of performances that can be mounted in these location, but it also limits the number of students and audience members that can participate or attend these performances. In addition, this absence of space forces campuses to rent out external venues for larger productions, combined performances or competitions, adding additional cost to the District's lean budget.

In 2016, the Plano ISD community approved \$64 million as part of the \$481 million bond for the design and construction of a multi-use, cross disciplinary performance and exhibition center. With the completion of this center, the District can provide spaces with size, capability, and quality needed to support all of Plano ISD's fine arts disciplines and talented students. It will also provide an attractive gathering space for the entire Plano community.

The Robbie & Lynore Robinson Fine Arts Center, named in memor Dr. George "Robbie" S. Robinson, Jr. and his wife Lynore, is set to open formally in the fall of 2021.

Conveniently located at 1800 Alma Drive in Plano across from Academy High School, the Robbie & Lynore Fine Arts Center can accommodate the more than 325 performances, rehearsals, and events scheduled each year through Plano ISD's fine arts program.

Additionally, the Center will be available for public and corporate use, including trainings, conferences, receptions, and other events, making this facility a significant asset not only to Plano ISD, but the entire Plano community.

While the citizens of Plano generously approved the bond that funded the design and construction of the Robbie & Lynore Robinson Fine Arts Center, the annual programming and operating costs of the facility are estimated to be \$660,000 annually. These costs include staffing and programming support, utilities, general operations, and maintenance - none of which eligible for the bond funding under Texas law.

For this reason, the Plano ISD Education Foundation has launched a \$3.2 million endowment campaign called *Staging the Future*, which will ensure the long-term financial stability of the Robbie & Lynore Fine Arts Center and establish it as an ever-present resource for Plano ISD students and the Plano community.

The Staging the Future endowment committee is chaired by Missy Bender, former Plano ISD Board of Trustees President and Director of Advocacy and Outreach for Raise Your Hand Texas Foundation who believes
